SB#1: Demonstrate—Syllable Patterns

Syllable Patterns	Examples	Student Examples
Closed syllables end in at least one consonant; the vowel is short.	 pan ex-it shot rab-bit mag-net Mon-day 	1. 2.
Open syllables end in one vowel; the vowel is long.	 <u>so</u> <u>he</u> <u>ba</u>-con <u>ba-by</u> <u>i</u>-tem 	1. 2.

Vowel-consonant- <i>e</i> syllables end in one vowel, one consonant, and a final <i>e</i> . The final <i>e</i> is silent and the vowel is long.	 make in-vite ripe pro-file lone-ly wish-bone 	1. 2.
Final stable syllables have a consonant- <i>l</i> - <i>e</i> combination or a single unit such as <i>-tion</i> . Final stable syllables have unexpected pronunciations—that is, they don't match what you might say if you tried to sound them out—but each one is always pronounced the same way.	 puz-<u>zle</u> sta-<u>tion</u> con-trac-<u>tion</u> can-<u>dle</u> frac-<u>tion</u> 	1. 2.
